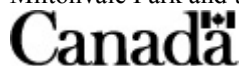

Municipal Achievement Award



Finance Chair Gail Ling accepted the Municipal
Achievement Award on behalf of the Community of
Miltonvale Park from Irene Dawson at the FPEIM
(Federation of PEI Municipalities) Annual Meeting. The
citation read as follows:

*The Community of Miltonvale Park has certainly
worked hard to enhance the quality of life for its
citizens over the past few years. They have
increased their office hours and hired a part-time
development officer.*

*Financial support from the Capacity Building
Fund has enabled the community to begin to
develop a more user-friendly official plan, and also
to carry out an extensive water and wastewater
feasibility study.*

*A new shelter was built in the community park
for the 2007 season, and it was a popular place to
hold both community and private events. Council is
in the process of establishing a community garden
next to the community park. They have also allotted
funding in the 2008 budget to promote green
initiatives. The municipality also has had a bursary
program for a number of years and recently
adopted a gift and donation policy to help fund
community groups and individuals attending out of
province competitions.*

*Council keeps in contact with its residents
through a community newsletter distributed 2-3
times per year and a community website. Miltonvale
Park has been able to bring about many positive
changes in the community over the recent years.*

Park Staff and Summer Program

Student Jessica MacKinnon is returning for her third summer as Summer Recreation Director for the Community of Miltonvale Park. Council received partial funding from Canada Summer Jobs program for this position. Jessica will be at the park from 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. with a lunch break from 12:30 -1:00 daily, during which time she will **NOT** be supervising children, and the shelter will close. Council also plans to hire someone as soon as possible to provide supervision at the park during evenings 'til dusk and during some weekend hours. Park hours will be posted at the shelter and on the website when a second staff person is hired.

Park Program -What it is -and what it isn't!

- Is for school aged children.
- Is so parents can let children go to the park knowing that there is a responsible person keeping an eye out for the children.

- Is a drop in program (i.e. NOT all day!)

The park program is NOT a babysitting service.

- Jessica and the other park staff **cannot** be responsible for pre-school children - they should be accompanied by a caregiver.
- Does not provide snacks or meals.

Parents -

- Please send children with sunscreen.
- Please encourage children to be respectful to staff and other park users!
- Ensure your children have a safe way home when the park is closed for lunch or the evening.
- Fill out a registration form, so staff are aware if there are allergies or issues, and leave emergency contact numbers, for **every** time your child is at the park in the event you are needed.



If you have toys or games that your children no longer enjoy playing with, please check with Jessica at the park to see if they might be of use.

COMMUNITY GARDEN – NEXT YEAR??

There was not enough interest to go ahead with the plans for a community garden in the community pasture land this year. It is hoped that the summer recreation program will see a small garden started with the youth who attend.



COMMUNITY PARK - The Cornwall and Area Minor Baseball Association rents the ball field on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings to run their program. If your team or league would like to reserve the ball field on any of the other nights, contact the Council office or Joannie MacKinnon at 368-2365. A small fee is charged to adult teams and to youth teams from outside the community.

The complete "Park Use" policy is found on the web site (or call or drop in to the office to pick up a copy). The community requests that the fields and buildings are left in an acceptable condition after use.

People are welcome to drop in to the shelter when it is open for the recreation program (advance notice would be appreciated for large groups), and can reserve the shelter for private use at other times. Miltonvale Park residents can use it for free, but must pay a damage deposit. Non-residents may use the park shelter for a fee of \$50 for half day or \$75 for full day. A damage deposit of \$200 in cash is also required, and the user would be responsible for any damages above that amount.

A recent addition to the park is a baby barn to store the community's barbeque and larger equipment.

The phone number of the shelter is 368-7587. Bookings are done through Joannie MacKinnon, at 368-2365.

Residents are reminded

- ✓ to treat the community park and staff with respect.
- ✓ to put garbage in the containers provided.
- ✓ the park is closed from dusk to dawn.
- ✓ dog owners are requested to keep your dogs on a leash and to please "pooper-scoop" after your pets! ✓

The water is presently under a "Boil Water" order for the presence of coli form, so users are advised to drink the bottled water Council will continue to provide. A new well will be dug as soon as possible.



DONATIONS

The Community of Miltonvale Park donated \$500 to Central Queens Elementary School Playground. Miltonvale Park resident, and dad of Madeline and Tristan, Basil Dickson is chairing the fundraising committee for the new playground to be built in Hunter River. Many of the children of the community attend this school for their first six years of education, and Council was pleased to support this worthwhile project. It is hoped that encouraging active children will help them grow to active, healthy adults.



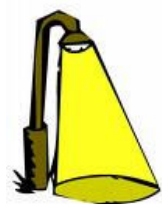
Council also recently made a small monetary donation to Danielle Stewart to assist with costs of attending national synchronized swimming competitions in Alberta in early June. If you are representing the region or province at a national event, check the donation and gift policy on the "Council Information/Policy" section of the website. Council has also made \$100 donations to the South Milton and Springvale WIs to help with local projects and the purchase of flowers, and has donated \$1200 to the Milton Community Hall towards a new roof.

MONEY MATTERS

Council has received word of two unexpected changes in income since the community's budget was passed. The Municipal Support Grant, which is "equalization" for municipalities from the province, has been increased to \$12,400 from \$5634 in 2007. The province also announced that it will no longer be collecting a tax administration fee to collect and remit the municipal portion of property tax; this will represent a savings to the community of \$4900.

YOU LIGHT UP MY LIFE!

Council has approved the installation of several streetlights for the community as a pilot project for a one year trial period. Two lights will soon be installed where the Sleepy Hollow Road intersects with Heather Drive and with Royalty Road.



COMMUNITY MAILBOXES

Word has been received from Canada Post that due to safety concerns, the locations of the community mailboxes near Terpstras on the Rustico Road and on the North York River Road are being reviewed. COMMUNITY SIGNS - **Thanks** are extended to Dr. Shawn McKenna and family for agreeing to "host" a "Welcome to the Community of Miltonvale Park" sign at the entrance to the community on the Lower Malpeque Road. The other new sign will be displayed on the Rte 2, as traffic leaves Winsloe. Thank you to the other landowners who also agreed to host signs. As new signs are purchased, they will be erected at other entrances to the municipality.

SPECIAL PLANNING AREA REGULATIONS -

Council has applied, as the lead community, for funding under the New Deal for Cities and Communities (Gas Tax) Infrastructure program, along with the other communities in the Special Planning Areas around Cornwall, Stratford and Charlottetown. We hope to investigate the effects of the special planning areas, educate the affected communities about these restrictions to subdivision, and after public and stakeholder consultations, recommend a new model to the Department of Community, Cultural Affairs and Labour.

WATER AND SEWER STUDY - Thank you to all residents who took the time to complete 125 surveys of the 635 mailed out by Engineering Technologies Canada. They are the consultants who were chosen to provide the community with a comprehensive study regarding the feasibility of water and sewer options for the community (also funded by the New Deal for Cities and Communities). The draw for the two residents who will win the \$50 cash prizes will take place at Canada Day. Council voted to extend the deadline to July 1st for receipt of the survey, so **it is not too late** to return your survey to the Council office, (or bring it to Canada Day) as the more information that is provided, the more accurate the results.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Twenty-three residents and Councillors attended the community's March annual meeting, which saw the circulated budget adopted. Council, at a special meeting immediately following the annual meeting, voted to maintain the municipal tax rate at \$.14/\$100 for residential assessment and \$.80/\$100 for commercial assessment. Residents raised concern regarding the water situation in Sleepy Hollow, and the lack of street lights. CHILD BURSARY PROGRAM

All parents/guardians of children who live in the Community of Miltonvale Park can receive up to \$50 per child, per year, to reimburse costs incurred for their child(ren)'s extra-curricular cultural or sporting activities, camps, or lessons. A receipt (or acceptable copy) must be included with the application form which is available from the office or www.miltonvalepark.com. (council information/on-line documents).



NEED A DEVELOPMENT PERMIT?

YES - If you are planning to ...

- construct a new building,
- locate or change the location of any building or structure on a lot,
- locate a mobile home on a lot,
- make any structural alterations that will change the exterior dimensions of any building, including decks.
- build a swimming pool,
- change the use of any building or land
- intensify any non-conforming use,
- construct a fence taller than six feet,
- or erect a satellite dish.



Permit fees will be **doubled** for construction that has started without the necessary permits.

Development Officer Alfie Wakelin works for Miltonvale Park on Monday mornings, beginning at 8:00 a.m. Please allow time for your permit to be approved **before** you plan to start construction, and call ahead to ensure he is in the office when you want to meet with him, as he is often visiting properties.

Please note there is a 21 day time limit to appeal any permits. Contact the Development Officer Alfie Wakelin at the Council Office at 368-3090 as soon as possible if you have any concerns.

The province is still developing a website to publicize all permits to aid the public if an appeal is warranted. Miltonvale Park also posts permits on our website and at the Council Office.

FEE SCHEDULE FOR DEVELOPMENT



- as of June 24, 2008

New Building or Structure, Addition to, or Relocation of existing building or structure fees - \$0.10 per sq.ft., with a minimum fee of \$25 and a maximum of \$1000.

Accessory buildings for agricultural purposes will have a maximum permit fee of \$200

Change of use of existing bldg./structure - \$100

Deck Fee - \$15

Subdivision Fee -Up to 5 lots - \$150 per lot, with each additional lot incurring \$100 additional fee

Lot Consolidation Fee -\$100

Lot Revision Fee - \$100

Additional fees would be levied if official plan amendments or rezoning changes are required, at actual cost (minimum \$300, for publicity, public meeting, planning, and administration time.)

Development applications can be downloaded from the website, or obtained from the office.

Policy for cancellations or withdrawn applications:

A processing fee will be retained for permits where Staff, Planning Board or Council have carried out work on the file with a minimum processing fee of \$25 and with a maximum refund to be 25% of the fee paid where Planning Board or Council have acted on a file and the applicant either withdraws the permit or wants to cancel the process. June 24/08

Fighting Mold — The Homeowners' Guide

Why are molds a concern? Damage to materials, fabrics, and even wood rot) is a concern. When molds are growing inside the home, there may be health concerns. Molds release chemicals and spores, whose health effects range from being insignificant to causing allergic reactions and illness.

Pregnant women, infants, the elderly and those with health problems, such as respiratory disease or a weakened immune system, are more at risk when exposed to mold. Consult your family physician if you believe there is someone who may be at risk.

Is there a mold problem?

Molds are always found in the air outside and in all buildings. They come into the home in many ways — through open windows or doors, on clothing, pets, food or furniture. The problem starts when mold grows inside the home. The presence of mold is a sign that there is too much moisture in your home — a situation which must be corrected. Inspect the home to find the extent of the mold.

How can you tell if it is mold?

Discoloration - Discoloration is a sign of mold. However, all discoloration is not due to mold (eg. outdoor pollution entering the home, burning candles or cigarettes). Mold may be any colour. Dab a drop of household bleach onto a suspected spot. If the stain loses its colour or disappears, it may be mold. If there is no change, it probably isn't mold.

Smell/Odour - Sometimes molds are hidden and cannot be seen. A musty or earthy smell often indicates the presence of molds. But a smell may not be present for all molds. Even when you don't notice a smell, wet spots, dampness or evidence of a water leak are indications of moisture problems and mold may follow.

How much mold is growing?

Mold is considered to cover a "small area" if the patch is no larger than a square meter. There should be no more than three patches, each patch smaller than a square meter. Clean up small areas yourself using a detergent solution, household rubber gloves and a dust mask for protection. Small moldy areas in homes may become larger over time, if ignored, so it's important to clean up and remove even small patches of mold. Use safety glasses or goggles; a disposable dust mask (3M 8210 or equivalent); and household rubber gloves. Bleach is NOT recommended.

The presence of organic materials, the pH (acidity/alkalinity) of the water, the surface material and contact time affect the effectiveness of bleach for disinfection. Since these factors are not generally controlled, bleach cannot be relied upon for disinfection. The most compelling reason for advising against bleach is that fumes are harmful but in addition, overuse of bleach will result in increased releases of chlorinated effluents which can be harmful to the environment. Infants and other family members with asthma, allergies or other health problems should not be in the work area or adjacent room during the cleaning.

Washable surfaces:

Scrub with an unscented detergent solution; then sponge with a clean, wet rag and dry quickly. Using an unscented detergent will make it easier for you to detect residual moldy odours.

Moldy drywall: Clean the surface with a damp rag using baking soda or a bit of detergent. Do not allow the drywall to get too wet.

Mold that comes back after cleaning is usually an indication that a source of moisture has not been removed. Seek professional help.

The mold area is considered "**moderate**" if there are more than three patches, each smaller than a square meter, or there is one or more isolated patches larger than a square meter but smaller the size of a sheet of plywood. Assessment by a professional is recommended. You can clean up moderate amounts of mold but you must follow the proper procedures and use the proper protective equipment.

A mold area is considered "**extensive**" if a single patch of mold is larger in area than a sheet of plywood. Being exposed to this much mold is not a good idea. Do **not** attempt to clean up large areas of mold yourself. You need professional help to determine why the mold is there in the first place and how to clean it up.

Seek professional help if there is a lot of mold, if the home is very damp and moist, if mold comes back after repeated cleaning or if a family member suffers from asthma or respiratory problems or other health problems that appear to be aggravated inside the home. **For more information - Contact your local CMHC office at 566-7336 or call council, 368-3090 to get the entire article.**
